

A new collaboration with the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE) will start in 2023. The study, on "Social mobility from the middle to the top", builds on research already done as part of the Transforming Social Inequalities Through Inclusive Climate Action project (TSITICA) project. The new research will form part of the LSE's International Inequalities Institute work under its research theme of "wealth, elites and tax justice", led by Prof. Mike Savage. This important research on asset and wealth inequalities that affect social mobility draws attention to how asset stocks in the top half of the income distribution affect broader social divisions. Through this partnership, ACEIR will contribute a much-needed perspective from the Global South to this field of research.



This conference on "Reducing inequality – the great challenge of our time" resonates especially within Africa, home to six of the 10 most unequal countries in the world and, correspondingly, over half of the world's poor – in particular the extremely poor. With the





event aimed at discussing research on inequality and the policy take-aways, ACEIR partnered with UNU-WIDER's World Income Inequality Database (WIID) project to bring African knowledge and perspectives to this forum.

NEWS | ARUA vice-chancellors meet leaders of European research universities grouping



In early November, UCT hosted a high-level delegation of 16 vice-chancellors from the African Research Universities Alliance (ARUA) and 15 leaders from the Guild of European Research-Intensive Universities (The Guild). A media statement described the purpose of the gathering as "to discuss the formation of clusters of excellence with multimillion euros in funding" that will expand on the work of ARUA's existing Centres of Excellence (CoEs), which have "already played a significant role in fostering collaboration on the continent and providing strong instruments that promote African-centred knowledge".

At a media discussion following the meetings, the 13 ARUA CoEs were introduced with a short video and presentations from a handful of selected CoEs. One of the centres that were showcased was the ARUA Centre of Excellence in Climate and Development (hosted at UCT), where ARUA-CD director Prof Mark Newman also spoke about a joint project with ACEIR – Transforming Social Inequalities Through Inclusive Climate Action (TSITICA).


NEWS | ACEIR @ the World Science Forum 2022

Every two years, hundreds of leading scientists, decision-makers from the world of politics and industry, civil society, and media representatives from over 100 countries gather to talk about the new challenges facing science in the 21st century. The event was staged in Cape Town this year, with exhibition themes on the role of science for climate change, poverty, inequality, and sustainability. We are grateful to UCT's Southern Africa Labour and Development Research Unit (SALDRU), which led the establishment of ACEIR and hosts the centre at UCT, for showcasing ACEIR's contributions to the research evidence base on African poverty and inequality at this event.









SALDRU was among a handful of UCT units who were invited by the university's Global Strategy & Visibility team to showcase their work. The exhibition, which focused on themes related to the role of science for climate change, poverty, inequality, and sustainability, presented ACEIR with an opportunity to talk about our work to visitors from around the globe.

Meeting supported by the Carnegie Corporation of New York (CCNY) at the University of Pretoria. It brought together more than 70 ECRs from Africa to network with their peers and consider the development of transdisciplinary research agendas that can connect the expertise of African researchers and facilitate the co-creation of knowledge that can influence policies and decision-making.



Measuring income, wealth and well-being in Africa

Two researchers who are part of the ACEIR teams recently presented papers at a special conference on "Measuring income, wealth and well-being in Africa". The event was hosted by the International Association for Research in Income and Wealth (IARIW) in partnership with the Tanzania National Bureau of Statistics on 11 - 13 November 2022 in Arusha, Tanzania. The aim was to advance the understanding of issues related to measuring national accounts, prices, productivity, income and wealth distribution, poverty, and economic well-being in the countries of Africa by drawing on past measurement of trends in these variables and identifying future measurement challenges.

Dr Monica Lambon- Quayefio (University of Ghana) presented a paper on "Walking for water and fuelwood: Welfare implications for women in Ghana" and A/Prof Nkechi S. Owoo (University of Ghana) on "Internalisation of patriarchal attitudes and women's labour market outcomes and asset ownership in Nigeria". Selected papers from the conference will be published in a supplementary issue of the *Review of Income and Wealth*.
