NEWS | Explore the roots of inequality, poverty, and deprivation in Africa



The TSITICA project was one of the hosts of a transdisciplinary research forum to advance the understanding of pathways of change in social responses to climate change in sub-Saharan Africa and Latin America. The event in mid-March was held in partnership with the African Research Universities Alliance and NISANSA, a joint project of the University of Marburg and University of Giessen, Germany, which focuses on climate change impacts the societies of the Global South. On the first day, ACEIR researcher Dr Fabio Andrés Díaz Pabón and ACEIR affiliate Prof. David Lam contributed to a panel discussion that contextualised dynamics of human development and well-being in the climate crisis.

Dr Fabio Andrés Díaz Pabón was a guest speaker at the interdisciplinary seminar series of the Institute for Humanities in Africa (HUMA), University of Cape Town, early in March. He discussed climate change-related shocks, assets, and welfare outcomes in South Africa. This research was part of the TSITICA project and investigated the effects of the 2015/2016 drought on individual welfare and assess whether access to assets helps alleviate these negative impacts.


